Jason has acquired a variety of national and international experience over more than 15 years of practice, including design on the widely-acclaimed Morgan Library and Museum while at Renzo Piano Architects in Paris and award-winning multi-family projects with DiMella Shaffer in Boston. He has managed projects with budgets from \$1,000 to \$35M, including commercial, single and multi-family housing, university buildings, and historic preservation.

Jason believes thoughtful design has the power to inspire people in their daily life, and sees the work of CUBE as a balance of ideas, the building site, finance, and construction logic. Jason is a contributor to the book *Suburban Transformations* by Paul Lukez, which proposes innovative planning strategies for creating sustainable and distinctive communities. He has lectured about CUBE's adaptive reuse and preservation strategies at Historic New England's Looking Forward Symposium, the Boston Preservation Alliance, the BSA Historic Resources Committee, and Build Boston. While at MIT, he conducted research on alternative building systems and materials. He has taught at MIT, Wentworth Institute of Technology, the Boston Architectural College and North Carolina State University. He currently serves on the Chapel Hill Community Design Commission.

Jason is a registered architect with an NCARB certificate, and has been certified by the U.S. Green Building Council as an accredited professional of LEED (Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design). He holds a Master of Architecture degree from the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, a Bachelor of Design from the University of Florida, and an Associate of Arts from St. Petersburg College.
